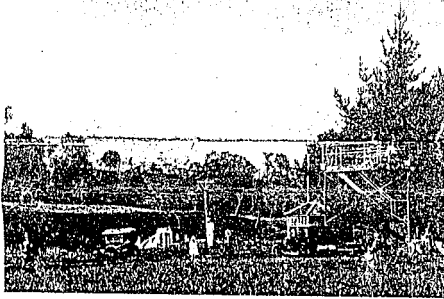


The Pleasure Park of TUI GLEN

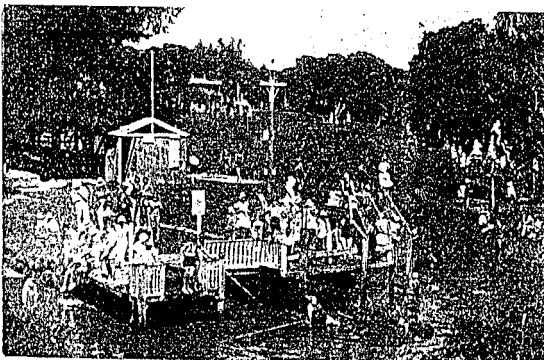

Just about ten miles, over excellent concrete roads, from the C.P.O. in Queen Street, Auckland, and the usual route that is followed in travelling there by private vehicle is by traversing the Great North Road highway extending from Grafton Bridge, city,

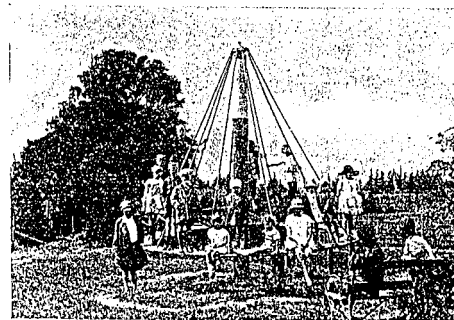

There are boats and canoes, all in A1 at Lloyd's condition, which you may hire for the afternoon, or by the hour, just as you please. Tennis has not been ignored, and there are fine chip courts, with nets supplied, on which one may play for a
