6 CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT

Welcome everyone and thanks for the opportunity to report back on what has been a very busy month for me as your Chairperson.

It began with a meeting between our Mayor, Police District Commander, and members of some of Henderson's most established families and landowners regarding their concerns about the present situation in Henderson.

I spoke briefly at our last meeting about this meeting, and our community constable also raised his concerns at our last meeting.

As an outcome of the meeting with the Mayor and others, there will be certain outcomes sought and achieved. How and when they will be achieved is yet to be fully established but plans are in motion and on behalf of the Henderson Community Board I have given an undertaking to be as involved as we need to be in order to urgently address the reduction in crime in our main street.

The following evening I spent time in the delightful company of the children (and their families) of Henderson South, at a Community Evening at the Bruce McLaren Intermediate School. We looked at the ideas and needs the children have identified for the area's community project, and I was delighted by the creativity of the children. They really have a way of going to the heart of the problem and thinking outside the square.

At the end of the evening Bill Postlewaight and I had the privilege of giving the prize basket to the winner of a draw, a young lady with a large family, all of whom were very excited by her win.

It was a lovely note to end the evening on and I look forward to outcomes of the work that is being undertaken to enhance the social environment in that area. To the children and their families who came along and participated thank you for your input.

The following morning I attended a Community Boards Association meeting (as alternative). I found it a very interesting meeting. The issues discussed were very pertinent to us in regard to the new Local Government New Zealand Act and it was interesting to hear what is happening with Community Boards in other areas too.

On Monday afternoon I attended the handover of the Te Atatu Ladies Bowling Club premises to the Council. It was a small but very friendly function and I must say I was very impressed with both the hospitality and the sparkling condition of the clubrooms they have given back to Council. It is a shame that dwindling membership has meant that the club has closed, but full marks to the club for their willingness to give their assets back to the community.

On Friday, 11 April 2003 I attended the function to launch "The Waitakere Way" a research project undertaken by University of Auckland jointly with the Council. What a wonderful trip down memory lane, particularly for those whose involvement in Waitakere stretches back many more years than mine. It was very well attended and the hit of the evening was undoubtedly the little dancers from the Waitakere Indian Association who followed Mayor Bob's welcome. It was a chance for us as a community to stop and look back at the last ten –twenty years and say this is where we have come from and haven't we come a long way.

A training workshop for the display of the Long Term Council Community Plan consultation with the community was useful and I was surprised there weren't more attendees from our Board. We have set the dates and times for our consultation and the first one took place on Saturday morning at the Pacifica Market at Corban's Estate.

Sadly there weren't many people there but Annette and I managed to have some good feedback from some young citizens who will be about 21 when the ten years are up and they had some great ideas about what they wanted their city to be about.

I attended the Anzac service at Henderson RSA on Anzac Day and again it struck me that the ranks are getting thinner every year. I never attend such occasions without thinking of my father and uncle and the speeches about sacrifice come home to me. My father started smoking as a soldier and that is what brought about his death at a relatively young age. He served in Africa, Egypt and Crete and like many others his general health suffered as a result of those arduous campaigns.

He never wanted to speak of his war experiences except to tell us of the futility of war and the terrible waste of men. Like many who went overseas he felt that those in charge, the politicians had scant regard for the human cost and he was cynical about the rights of any Government to go to war except as a last resort. I don't think anything that has happened since in the various theatres of war would have changed his mind or the minds of the men and women who have served New Zealand.

Finally I would just like to remind members that we have a very busy month ahead of us with taking the Long Term Council Community Plan out to the community and also preparing our own submission to the Annual Plan so I don't expect the pace to let up at all. We also have the 2003 Community Boards Conference in June and we have funding for one member to attend from each Board. We have an entry at that Conference together with the other Waitakere City Boards and Bob Jessop from Massey Community Board has kindly offered to show us that entry after the meeting closes tonight for those who can stay behind.








That's been my month.

9 **CATHERINE MALL 'WALKWAY OF FAME'**

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The Henderson Community Board is requested to make a decision, for recommendation to the Council, on candidates to be included in Henderson's "Walkway of Fame".

BACKGROUND

This project was initiated some three years ago by Henderson Community Board member Barry Shaw, who proposed a Walkway of Fame to promote community pride and to provide an interesting public feature in the Henderson Town Centre.

The suggestion was that famous (or infamous) local identities would have their hand or foot imprint etched into granite slabs in the walkway area, along with suitable text acknowledging their achievements.

In 2000 public nominations were called for through local newspapers. The response was somewhat disappointing; less than 20 nominations were received and a number did not fit the Council's criteria of having contributed significantly to the region's success or of having been born in - or lived in - Waitakere City.

After receiving a shortlist of candidates, Council left the final decision to the Henderson Community Board. In May 2000 the following were inaugural inductees:

- Rugby legend Michael Jones;
- Author Maurice Shadbolt;
- Athletics great Roy Williams.

The following year Elected Members nominated candidates and former Mayor Assid Corban, educationalist and Maori leader Dr Pita Sharples and musician Neil Finn were inducted.

Recently, we have made contact with the International Walkway of Fame Group (based in Canada) with a view to registering our project with them. This group aims to establish a website where information on walkways throughout the world can be accessed by tourists.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

The Walkway of Fame project supports several of Council's objectives, most particularly in the area of urban villages, by improving the appearance and community focus of the Henderson town centre. It strengthens local communities through celebrating success and acknowledging role models. The project also further demonstrates the City's commitment to installing functional art in public spaces.

ISSUES

There is funding in the current year's budget for two new inductees. The Board is asked, however, to give consideration for up to four nominees. This would allow for any of those chosen/approached to be "substituted" in the event of not accepting induction, unavailability, etc.

The public were again given the opportunity to name nominations (via the council's web-site); this was advertised in local newspapers. Suggestions were also sought from Councillors, Community Board members and members of Te Taumata Runanga.

A shortlist, based on the highest number of nominations received, is as follows:

- June Mariu, former New Zealand softball, basketball and netball representative, national president of the Maori Women's Welfare League, former Chairperson Te Whanau O Waipareira Trust;
- Dorothy Butler (Karekare), children's author and literacy campaigner;
- Speaker of the House, Rt Hon Jonathan Hunt (New Zealand's longest serving Member of Parliament);
- Former Waitemata Mayor and now Mayor of Invercargill, Tim Shadbolt.

Two other candidates, namely:

- the Governor General, Dame Sylvia Cartwright (former Henderson District Court Judge);
- former Crown Lynn head, Sir Tom Clark (who has previously been inducted into the City's Business Hall of Fame and the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame).

were the highest "polling" unsuccessful nominees last year.

The method used for etching images and text onto the paving stones in Catherine Mall has been a success. The black granite stones have proved to be durable and safe (a non-slip sealant is applied). It is proposed that this method of presentation be continued.

The lead-time for producing and installing the tablets is 4-6 weeks. On-site work includes lifting existing flagstones, which will be replaced by the new granite tablets. A temporary surface will be installed for safety reasons. Once candidates are selected and the tablets produced, it is proposed that a small unveiling ceremony will be held.

CONCLUSION

The Walkway of Fame has become a feature of the Henderson Town Centre and is set to be included on an international register as a tourism attraction. The Henderson Community Board is asked to make a selection of candidates for inclusion in the walkway for 2003.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That the Henderson Community Board selects four candidates - in priority order - for inclusion in the Catherine Mall "Walkway of Fame" (the first two of whom will be initially invited to take part).

10 COMMUNITY WELLBEING FUND CHANGES TO ALLOCATION

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of the report is to inform the Henderson Community Board of the recommendations made at the Community Wellbeing Workshop, which reviewed how the Community Wellbeing Funds should be allocated.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting on 23 February 2000, Council resolved the following in relation to the allocation process of the Community Wellbeing Fund:

- “1. That Council delegate authority to the Community Facilities and Recreation Committee to consider all citywide applications to the Community Wellbeing Fund.
2. That the Community Wellbeing Fund be split by assigning \$40,000 to the Community Boards to allocate to local applications and \$40,000 be retained for allocation of city-wide and across ward boundary applications.
3. That the \$40,000 assigned to the Community Boards be distributed on a pro-rata population basis.”

373/2000

During the allocation process in late 2002 the following resolutions were passed by Waitakere and Henderson Community Boards as a result of the time it took to hear all the applicants and to make the decisions on the allocation.

“That the Waitakere Community Board request Council to reconsider the Community Wellbeing Fund processing and assessment of applications and that options be brought back to the Community Board for their consideration.”

3161/2002

“That the Community Wellbeing Fund applications come before the Henderson Community Board, a working party of the Board meet with officers beforehand to work through and prioritise the applications.”

3194/2002

As a result of the above resolutions a workshop was organised on Wednesday, 9 April 2003 consisting of representatives of all Community Boards. The purpose of this workshop was to consider options on how best to allocate funds for 2003/2004.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

The Community Wellbeing Fund aligns with Council's Community Assistance Policy with the goal of the Policy being to help strengthen the ability of local community groups to create a strong social base for Waitakere City and to meet local needs. In the Community Wellbeing Fund an applicant must meet one or more of the objectives from the Community Assistance Policy, which helps achieve this strategic goal.

ISSUES

As indicated earlier in this report, there are two issues that resulted in the request to re-look at how the Community Wellbeing Fund is allocated.

These were:

1. Increase Of Applicants To Fund

Over the past three years the total applicants applying to the fund and the amount applied for from the Community Wellbeing Fund has increased dramatically as shown by the following:

2. Increase In The Time It Takes To Make Decisions

Because of the increase in the volume of applications it has increased the time it takes at Community Boards to make considered decisions and to hear the number of organisations who now wish to speak in support of their applications.

As a result of the increased time pressures, following is a list of alternatives that was put forward to the workshop by the Community Assistance Administrator for consideration:

1. That a working party from each Community Board meet with officers before the regular Community Board Meeting to prioritise applications.
2. That a separate meeting of the Community Boards are set once a year to hear the applications and make decisions, so removing this issue from the regular meeting time.
3. That in future the option to speak to each application is removed, so reducing the time it takes to make the decision regarding the allocation.
4. That there is no change to the way it is currently allocated but that officers give greater guidance to the Community Boards on how to make decision making easier.
5. Amalgamate the Citywide and Community Board allocation under one Sub Committee and hear the speakers at one meeting and make the recommendations on another. (Still keeping the balance of allocations to wards as currently).
6. That the decision on allocation of the \$40,000 traditionally given by the Community Boards be allocated by a Sub Committee with representatives of each Community Board in line with the Community Sport Fund and the Creative Communities Sub Committee allocations.

3. Opportunity Given To Applicants For Funding To Speak In Support Of Their Application

Due to meeting constraints and the increase in volume of applications as outlined above it is at times difficult to accommodate applicants who wish to present their case in person. It is felt that those who do present may have an advantage over other groups or individuals. It should be noted that the provision to speak in support of an application is not uniformly applicable at present.

The following recommendations came from the working party that met on 9 April 2003 to discuss the above issues:

1. That the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Community Board allocation should be \$1,000.

2. That the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Citywide allocation should be \$3,000.
3. That the Community Board portion, of the Community Wellbeing Fund remain being allocated by the Community Boards, but without the provision of speaking rights to an application.

RESOURCES

There are no additional financial or staffing resources required for officers to allocate this fund. The community Assistance Administrator administers the process.

CONCLUSION

During the allocation process in late 2002 resolutions were passed asking for the way funds were allocated by Community Boards to be looked at. There are two issues that resulted in the request to re-look at how the Community Wellbeing Fund is allocated.

These were:

- increase of applicants to fund;
- increase in the time it takes to make decisions.

The following recommendations came from the working party that met on 9 April 2003 to discuss the above issues:

1. That the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Community Board allocation should be \$1,000.
2. That the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Citywide allocation should be \$3,000.
3. That the Community Board portion, of the Community Wellbeing Fund remain being allocated by the Community Boards, but without the provision of speaking rights to an application.

The reduction of the amount that can be allocated to any one applicant will bring applications more in line with the amount that can be realistically granted to an organisation.

The recommendations made to remove speaking rights will substantially remove the time it takes to allocate these funds.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That it be recommended to Council that the following recommendations of the working party:
 - that the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Community Board allocation should be \$1,000;
 - that the maximum amount any one applicant can apply for to the Community Wellbeing Fund, Citywide allocation should be \$3,000;
 - that the Community Board portion, of the Community Wellbeing Fund remain being allocated by the Community Boards, but without the provision of speaking rights to an application.

11 **KEEP WAITAKERE BEAUTIFUL TRUST 2003 COMMUNITY STREET TREE PLANTING PROGRAMME**

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is to seek ratification from the Henderson Community Board for the streets that have been selected for planting as part of the Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust's Community Street Tree Planting Programme for 2003.

BACKGROUND

Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust (KWB) is a community based, environmental trust funded by Waitakere City Council (Council). Keep Waitakere Beautiful has been working in partnership with Council since 1993 and for the past nine years, the Community Street Tree Planting Programme has been a successful core programme of Keep Waitakere Beautiful.

Keep Waitakere Beautiful delivers a wide variety of environmental projects as part of its annual calendar of events including Trees for Babies, Operation Spring Clean and Clean Stream Waitakere.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

Keep Waitakere Beautiful's Community Street Tree Planting Programme is an important component in implementing Council's Green Network and Well-being Support goals by involving the community in creating and improving their neighbourhoods. The planning of this annual programme takes into account requests from residents received throughout the year, recommendations from the Council Arborist, levels of existing vegetation (both on public and private land) and budget constraints.

ISSUES

Keep Waitakere Beautiful is currently planning the 2003 Community Street Tree Planting Programme. The programme aims to:

- complete at least 15 suburban street tree plantings each year;
- involve the local community in planning, executing and maintaining street tree plantings;
- provide a forum for community building;
- provide a forum for promoting Waitakere City Council partnerships.

Waitakere City residents were invited to nominate their street for planting through press releases and advertising. The Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust Board will initially review the streets nominated for planting at their meeting on 28 April 2003. These recommendations will be tabled at the May Community Board meeting for ratification.

The 2003 Keep Waitakere Beautiful Community Street Tree Planting Programme will be carried out during the month of June 2003, when there is optimum rain to maximise survival rates of the trees. As in previous years, wherever possible a local resident Street Co-ordinator will be appointed for each planting. This person is supported by Keep Waitakere Beautiful to liaise with and encourage the support of residents to undertake the planting and ideally oversee the long term care of the trees.

RESOURCES

The funds for this project have been provided for in Council's grant to Keep Waitakere Beautiful for 2003/2004 and Keep Waitakere Beautiful and Techscape staff will provide trees, equipment, guidance and technical assistance at each planting event.

Each planting begins with a welcome from representatives of Keep Waitakere Beautiful and the Community Board, a planting demonstration follows and the planting day concludes with a community BBQ organised by residents and Keep Waitakere Beautiful .

CONCLUSION

Keep Waitakere Beautiful will be delivering its annual Community Street Tree Planting Programme for the ninth consecutive year in June 2003. The Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust Board will initially review the streets nominated for planting at their meeting on 28 April 2003 and these recommendations will be tabled at the May Community Board meeting for ratification.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That the Henderson Community Board considers streets recommended by the Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust Board for planting as part of the Keep Waitakere Beautiful Community Street Tree Planting Programme for 2003.
3. That a representative/s of the New Lynn Community Board volunteer to assist at the local plantings.

12 GREAT NORTH ROAD - NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES CONTROL

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

This report seeks the approval of the Henderson Community Board for 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction on Great North Road, Henderson.

BACKGROUND

At the Police Meeting of August 2002, the issue was raised that there should be additional broken yellow no stopping lines on each side of Great North Road between James Laurie Street and View Road. Great North Road is a Regional Arterial Road. It has in the order of 25,000 vehicles per day at the subject location. This section of the road is on a slope and drivers have very limited visibility when approaching the top of the hill. Any vehicle stopped or parked on this area is dangerous and would significantly increase the congestion.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

This proposal contributes to Objective 3 "Access and Travel Choice" of the Urban Villages pathway to a sustainable city: *'People can get easily and safely to where they need to go by walking, cycling, passenger transport, or private vehicle, and businesses can efficiently move their goods and services'*.

Provision of 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' contributes to traffic efficiency, and to safety by preventing obstructions to visibility caused by parked vehicles.

ISSUES

This part of Great North Road is a four lane road, two lanes in each direction. Residential properties are located each side of the road. Parked vehicles can block the kerbside lane, decreasing traffic decreases capacity, and as a consequence long queues can develop, especially in peak traffic hours.

Vehicles parked on the side of road could also cause accidents as drivers have limited visibility.

The most effective solution to this problem is to provide 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' restrictions on each side of Great North Road. This section of road does not require street parking as adjacent residents provide off-street parking within their properties.

The accident record for Great North Road between James Laurie Street and View Road intersections shows a total of 81 accidents have occurred over the past five years and six involved parked cars. Parking surveys were also carried out in the afternoon and at night. No vehicles were observed parked on this section of the Great North Road. A letter drop was distributed to the residents at the subject location on 4 April 2003, a total of four residents responded, and three residents agreed to the proposal.

The location and extent of the proposed restriction is indicated on pages A1 to A2.

RESOURCES

Road marking for the proposed change can be implemented under the maintenance contracts for markings and signs, within funding available in the 2002/2003 Annual Plan.

CONCLUSION

The proposal for a 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction in Great North Road is desirable from a safety perspective, and would have minimal effect on parking as there is very little demand for parking on this section. The work can be funded from the annual maintenance budget.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That in relation to **GREAT NORTH ROAD, GLENDENE:**
 - a) That all existing parking restrictions or limitations (affected, or superseded, or replaced by this resolution) applicable to Great North Road, Glendene imposed by any prior resolution (including resolution of any former authority) cease to have any force and effect as from the date of this determination; provided however that any current enforcement action by way of prosecution arising from, or infringement notice issued in relation to, any non-compliance with or breach of any such parking restriction or limitation be authorised to be concluded in the normal manner.
 - b) That, in accordance with the powers conferred by virtue of the Local Government Act 1974, The Transport Act 1962 and the Waitakere City Council Bylaw No. 7, 1991 - Traffic, the following parking limitations and restrictions be now resolved to be specified and imposed namely:

- on the west kerb line of Great North Road from a start point 60 metres south of the southern kerb line of James Laurie Street to an end point 354 metres further south, a 'No Stopping At All Times' parking restriction be imposed;
 - on the west kerb line of Great North Road from a start point 407 metres south of the southern kerb line of James Laurie Street to an end point 665 metres further south, a 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction be imposed;
 - on the east kerb line of Great North Road from a start point 95 metres south of the southern kerb line of James Laurie Street to an end point 281 metres further south, a 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction be imposed;
 - on the east kerb line of Great North Road from a start point 290 metres south of the southern kerb line of James Laurie Street to an end point 305 metres further south, a 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction be imposed;
 - on the east kerb line of Great North Road from a start point 347 metres south of the southern kerb line of James Laurie Street to an end point 639 metres further south, a 'NO STOPPING AT ALL TIMES' parking restriction be imposed.
3. That the appropriate signage and markings, in accordance with the Traffic Regulations 1976, be hereby approved to be put in place to properly establish, delineate and record the said parking limitations and restrictions.
 4. That the detailed implementation of these recommendations be subject to the result of a letter drop questionnaire to the affected households, and to the discretion of the Service Manager: Transport Assets in regard to the questionnaire results.
