

DRAFT WAITAKERE CRIME PREVENTION PLAN 2007-2012

BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

Three years ago the Crime Prevention Unit in the Ministry of Justice (CPU) negotiated new funding arrangements with territorial authorities (TAs). This resulted in three broad categories of funding: metropolitan partnerships, provincial plans and targeted project funding. At the time Waitakere fell within the metropolitan partnership category and established a Crime Prevention strategy (2004-07) subsequently providing a solid platform for the development of the Waitakere Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2012.

With effect from the new contract period commencing 1 July 2007 the designation for Metropolitan TAs will be changed to "Strategic Partnerships" to reflect the nature of these partnerships, as a result Waitakere now falls within the Strategic Partnerships category.

Summary of CPU contract changes being introduced and the basic requirements of the new funding agreements;

Strategic Partnership TAs from 1 July 2007

- The number of TAs engaged in Strategic Partnerships will be expanded to 15.
- The existing 10 are the cities of North Shore, Waitakere, Auckland, Manukau, Hamilton, Tauranga, Hutt, Wellington, Christchurch and Dunedin.
- The additional 5 cities are Whangarei, Rotorua, Napier, Hastings and Palmerston North.

Basic Requirements of Strategic Partnerships

- For the 10 existing metropolitan TAs the contract term of the funding agreement will be set at 5 years, with a review of the progress and outcomes of the agreement at the 3 year stage. This review will assess progress and will determine any changes needed to achieve intended outcomes.
- Each TA will need to ensure that the following basic requirements are in place, or will be within a reasonable period:
 1. a governance board or committee to direct and monitor crime prevention plans, activities and outcomes;
 2. a crime prevention plan that meets the requirements of the TA and which sets out the broad crime prevention/reduction goals and objectives for the contract period;
 3. demonstrated linkage between the crime prevention plan and the relevant Long Term Council Community Plan (LTCCP);
 4. a system of reporting activities and outcomes at least once a year to the TA and to the CPU.

AIM

“To enable a Safer Community in Waitakere by working in partnership to prevent and reduce crime”.

OBJECTIVES

- Integrate Crime Prevention and Crime Reduction principles within overarching strategies for Waitakere
- Develop existing partnerships and establish new partnerships which will contribute to the achievement of the Crime Prevention Plan objectives
- Identify and prioritise Crime related issues for Waitakere
- Utilise intervention logic to develop and implement key action plans, projects and initiatives
- Incorporate evaluation mechanisms within the Crime Prevention Plan, its action plans, projects and initiatives

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

The Crime Prevention Plan 2007/12 will be aligned (in part) to the Social Strategy currently being developed for Waitakere.

Waitakere City Council has adopted 5 Strategic Priorities. These are regarded as overarching; everything the Council does must take them into account:

- The Treaty of Waitangi (Te Tiriti O Waitangi)
- Sustainable Development
- First Call for Children
- Safe City
- Lifelong Learning

While all have an impact on Community Safety, the First Call for Children and Safe City Priorities have and continue to play major roles impacting on Crime prevention, reduction and Community Safety.

Crime Prevention Plan Aim and Objectives

Crime Prevention Reference Group (CPRG)

The purpose of the CPRG is to contribute to the objectives of the Crime Prevention Plan by:

- Identifying and prioritising specific "key" projects to be included within the Crime Prevention Plan and approving related action plans
- Working in partnership to reduce and prevent crime within Waitakere
- Providing Strategic recommendations, advice and guidance at a local, regional and national level
- Monitoring and guiding the Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2012 and its component parts
- Maintaining a medium to long term focus spanning the 5 year period of the Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2012
- Providing a networking capability within which partnerships can develop to enhance crime prevention/reduction outcomes
- Leveraging additional funding and resources that support the Crime Prevention Plan

CPRG Reporting

A written report and presentation will be made annually to Council. This report will also be presented to the Ministry of Justice, Crime Prevention Unit, (CPU). The report will include all information identified as required in Schedule 5 of this contractual agreement with the Ministry of Justice.

CPRG Membership

CPRG will be made up of representatives from key agencies and community partnerships that have the ability to contribute to achieving the "aim" of the Crime Prevention Plan. Composition of the group will be finalised over an initial consultation period. Consideration will be given to the establishment of a smaller "core" membership that will perform a governance/steering function. CPRG membership:

CPRG Meetings will be quarterly.

City Safety Action Group (CSAG)

Purpose of the CSAG is to contribute to the objectives of the Crime Prevention Plan by:

- operating as an immediate point of reference for priority crime and community safety issues as and when they arise in Waitakere
- applying a problem solving approach to addressing prioritised Crime and Community Safety issues
- initiating multi-agency/partnership action.
- Focus predominantly on "situational" crime and community safety issues
- Maintaining a short to medium term focus (relative to the 5 year period of the Crime Prevention Plan ie projects that can be completed within 1 – 12 months)
- Link with and support the CPRG
- Receive guidance and direction from CPRG

This group is linked directly to the CPRG and CSAG has representation on the CPRG.

Membership

Membership of CSAG fluctuates according to the issues being addressed, with additional representation and staff involved as required. The group comprises the following members (or their nominated replacements) from Council and the Police:

Functions

The group convenes to discuss matters that are of particular concern between Police and Council. Matters dealt with may include:

- Emerging "hot spots" (eg Henderson CBD safety concerns)
- On-going problems (eg Graffiti Vandalism)
- Particular sites/localities (eg car parks)
- Planning for specific events
- Proactive opportunities policing (eg NHS)
- Input into and evaluation of plans and proposals

Process

The group will meet regularly (currently every 8 weeks) and any person can place items on the agenda through one of the core group. The Crime Prevention Project Leader- Safe Waitakere convenes the group. Matters before the Group are considered, prioritised and the actioned. Where appropriate specific action plans will be developed (which may include the establishment of specialist project teams).

Memorandum of Understanding

In March 2004 a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was established between Waitakere City Council and New Zealand Police. This document outlines a process to deal with issues such as:

- Information sharing
- Joint planning
- Collaboration.

A review and update of the MOU has been included as a requirement within the overall action plan.

Safe Waitakere

The Safe Waitakere Team within Council has a key role to carry out within the plan, in particular the Safe Waitakere Team Leader in a managerial/strategic capacity and the Crime Prevention Project Leader in a coordination/implementation capacity.

Overall Action Plan

An overall action plan has been developed to guide key areas of the Crime Prevention Plan 2007 – 2012.

Key Projects and Specific Action Plans.

Key projects and specific action plans will be established to focus on critical issues, namely:

- Public Violence
- Graffiti Vandalism
- Family Violence
- Volume Crime (Vehicle Crime)
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

In addition sub-projects have also been highlighted for development, namely:

- Truancy
- CCTV (Closed Circuit Television)

CONCLUSION

The Crime Prevention Plan 2007 – 2012 is intended to provide a solid framework that will enable a "Safer Waitakere". This plan has been developed utilising the learning obtained from the previous Crime Prevention Plan 2004-2007.

It is intended that further consultation and development will take place which will add value to the content of this plan.

Year 1 activity will focus on the development of cohesive and productive partnerships.

This plan recognises the strengths of our City and the Waitakere Way and that by working in partnership we can make a difference.

Possibilities for Development

- **Develop Pathway to Peace Summary:**
Steps Waitakere has already completed on the Pathway to Peace
- **Plant Pohutukawa:**
As done in 1983 in front of previous WCC building to honour the Nuclear Free Zone declaration.
- **Plant Camphor Tree from Hiroshima:**
Sapling gift available from Christchurch City Council
- **Culture of Peace Displays:**
There is a wealth of educational and cultural displays available that could be shown in prominent public spaces, including:
The 'Culture of Peace' Exhibition from Soka
And
The Christchurch Peace City –Nuclear Free NZ Exhibition
- **Create Waitakere Peace Exhibition Mural:**
This could be one of a series of exciting youth oriented community and school projects in public places. It could be a competition based citywide high profile process.
In addition, there could also be another arts project inviting professional or famous artists to produce public works illustrating peace themes as shown in Auckland City by VANA mural in K' rd Newton.
- **Host City for Peace Conference:**
Providing a high profile platform for the leading minds of NZ and the world who are working for Nuclear Disarmament and non-militaristic alternatives to global problems. This Forum could pursue United Nations Resolutions for Peace, Environmental and Social well-being through developing public understanding of the interdependence of the issues and civic responsibility to pursue positive solutions.
- **Produce End to Violence Educational Programmes:**
1/ Inner Peace – multicultural models offering meditation, philosophical enquiry, religious and spiritual education to nurture personal and social wellbeing. A plethora of groups offer courses ie. Tai chi, yoga, chanting, etc
2/ Community –interpersonal non-violence in relationships and conflict resolution as per programmes offered by VFW &AVP.
3/ International –Disarmament education, de-institutionalisation of War, understanding the role of media conditioning in maintaining the status quo of a 'culture of war' and the vital importance of NZ's Nuclear Free Peacemaker role in the global community working to avert nuclear holocaust.
- **Celebrate the "Peace Movement" in Waitakere:**
A significant example is the work of the West Auckland Peace group throughout the 1980s, many of those people are still resident in Waitakere.
- **Create messages for Peace:**
Media promotion campaign.
- **Hold a Waitakere Peace Cultural Festival:**
1/ This could be an 'added value' type of event in which an annual multicultural festival or other event could emphasise and reaffirm the ethos, purpose, meaning and value of being a "City for Peace".

2/ The main element of a 'Peace Festival' is that it highlights the organisations working for non-violence, social justice, disarmament, prevention of war etc. It would be an event providing educational workshops as well as a cultural feast.

- **Hold a series of Peace Concerts:**

This maintains the local focus and global momentum on the UNESCO International Decade for a Culture of Peace 2000-10

In Waitakere we have the successful prototype work by Free Spirit Peace Productions that has showcased a variety of performers and peace and justice issues in concert experiences.

Waitakere City for Peace Declaration

City for Peace Declaration

The City of Waitakere

- Acknowledges that peace is created through the actions of individuals, families and neighbourhoods and whānau, hapu and iwi;
- Is determined to protect and enhance the safety, security and well being of all people living in and visiting Waitakere;
- Affirms that the well being of all citizens is advanced by the peaceful resolution of conflict and the promotion of a culture of peace and non-violence;
- Celebrates the diverse backgrounds of all citizens and encourages their participation regardless of age, gender, ability, ethnicity, culture, sexuality or religion;
- Actively supports the importance of education for the development of peace, inter-cultural awareness, tolerance, human rights and conflict resolution;
- Acknowledges the unique relationships between tangata whenua and tau iwi (those who have settled more recently in Waitakere) and the place of Te Tiriti o Waitangi in our City;
- Encourages all people to treat whenua (the land), with respect;
- Assists those who have settled in Waitakere due to conflict or human rights violations in communities overseas, and supports the promotion of human rights and the resolution of conflicts in those communities;
- Confirms the special role of Waitakere as an Eco City in fostering peace nationally and internationally;
- Honours the United Nations International Decade for a Culture of Peace and Non-Violence for the Children of the World (2001-2010) and will maintain this commitment for future generations;
- Continues to endorse the United Nations Resolutions on Nuclear Disarmament and Non Proliferation through public education to abolish war and nuclear weapons;
- Embraces the United Nations recommendation that 'municipal leaders, working with citizen groups, are encouraged to establish peace cities';
- Hereby declares itself to be a City for Peace dedicated to the promotion of, and respect for peace, tolerance and non-violence.

Strategic Context

The Crime Prevention Plan 2007/12 will be aligned (in part) to the Social Strategy currently being developed for Waitakere.

Waitakere City Council has adopted 5 Strategic Priorities. These are regarded as overarching; everything the Council does must take them into account:

- Sustainable Development
- First Call for Children

- Lifelong Learning

While all have an impact on Community Safety, the First Call for Children and Safe City Priorities have and continue to play major roles impacting on Crime prevention, reduction and Community Safety.

Crime Prevention Reference Group (CPRG)

The purpose of the CPRG is to contribute to the objectives of the Crime Prevention Plan by:

- Identifying and prioritising specific "key" projects to be included within the Crime Prevention Plan and approving related action plans
- Working in partnership to reduce and prevent crime within Waitakere
- Providing Strategic recommendations, advice and guidance at a local, regional and national level
- Monitoring and guiding the Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2012 and its component parts
- Maintaining a medium to long term focus spanning the 5 year period of the Crime Prevention Plan 2007-2012
- Providing a networking capability within which partnerships can develop to enhance crime prevention/reduction outcomes
- Leveraging additional funding and resources that support the Crime Prevention Plan

CPRG Reporting

A written report and presentation will be made annually to Council. This report will also be presented to the Ministry of Justice, Crime Prevention Unit, (CPU). The report will include all information identified as required in Schedule 5 of this contractual agreement with the Ministry of Justice.

CPRG Membership

CPRG will be made up of representatives from key agencies and community partnerships that have the ability to contribute to achieving the "aim" of the Crime Prevention Plan. Composition of the group will be finalised over an initial consultation period. Consideration will be given to the establishment of a smaller "core" membership that will perform a governance/steering function. CPRG membership:

- initiating multi-agency/partnership action.
- Focus predominantly on "situational" crime and community safety issues
- Maintaining a short to medium term focus (relative to the 5 year period of the Crime Prevention Plan ie projects that can be completed within 1 – 12 months)
- Link with and support the CPRG
- Receive guidance and direction from CPRG

This group is linked directly to the CPRG and CSAG has representation on the CPRG.

Memorandum of Understanding

In March 2004 a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was established between Waitakere City Council and New Zealand Police. This document outlines a process to deal with issues such as:

- Information sharing
- Joint planning
- Collaboration.

A review and update of the MOU has been included as a requirement within the overall action plan.

Safe Waitakere

The Safe Waitakere Team within Council has a key role to carry out within the plan, in particular the Safe Waitakere Team Leader in a managerial/strategic capacity and the Crime Prevention Project Leader in a coordination/implementation capacity.

Overall Action Plan

An overall action plan has been developed to guide key areas of the Crime Prevention Plan 2007 – 2012.

Key Projects and Specific Action Plans.

Key projects and specific action plans will be established to focus on critical issues, namely:

- Public Violence
- Graffiti Vandalism
- Family Violence
- Volume Crime (Vehicle Crime)
- Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED)

In addition sub-projects have also been highlighted for development, namely:

- Truancy
- CCTV (Closed Circuit Television)
