WHY ECOSOURCE

Plants sourced from Waitakere City are better adapted to conditions here, are more likely to survive and will help to preserve the distinctiveness of plants from this region. Reductions to the diversity of life is becoming a world wide concern. By ecosourcing plants you can help.

WHERE WE SHOULD ECO-SOURCE

Eco-sourced plants will be of benefit in any area, including backyards.

They are particularly important in areas:

- of outstanding vegetation (e.g. Green Bay cliffs and around Moire Park, Massey);
- bordering streams;
- close to “wild populations” (e.g. bush properties like those on Scenic Drive and in Titirangi).

ECOSOURCING THE WAITAKERE WAY

Waitakere City Council is promoting eco-sourcing to improve the quality and quantity of native vegetation and protect the distinctiveness of plants and ecosystems in the City.

Ecosourcing also improves the habitats of native wildlife, which feed from our native trees, bushes and grass.

The principle - select plants grown from seeds collected as close as possible to where you plan to plant. As a minimum standard, use seeds or plants from within the Auckland area.

WILD SOURCING

Ecosourcing includes collecting stock from wild sources – the natural environment that the plant grows in.

SEEDS AND NOT CUTTINGS

Ecosourcing includes collecting seeds in preference to cuttings as a way of ensuring that naturally occurring diversity within each species is maintained as much as possible. Cloning or genetic manipulation through selection is not part of the ecosourcing practice.

ANNUAL COLLECTIONS

Ecosourcing includes collecting new seed on an annual basis. Don't use stored seeds over several years except in unusual circumstances, such as years of low seed numbers.

SOME PLANTS ARE EXEMPT

Some plants were purposely planted by Maori, and later by Europeans in places they would not occur naturally. Trees like karaka, for example, were planted by Maori to attract birds to dwelling sites, for food and for symbolic reasons. Ecosourcing is not relevant to plants such as karaka and flax where they have been moved from their natural environments.

LOOK FOR THE 'ECOSOURCED' LABEL

Waitakere has its own "Ecosourced" label (pictured below) that appears on ecosourced plants sold at participating outlets (see list opposite), and on those used for Green Network planting projects and events.

When you go to buy plants always check for the ecosourced label which states where the seeds were collected. Try to choose plants that came from an area as close as possible to where you are planting them.



DID YOU KNOW

- Waitakere City Council has an Ecosourcing Code of Practice. To obtain a copy, phone the Council's 24-hr Customer Service Line on 839-0400 or email greenetwork@waitakere.govt.nz
- The Council has a range of planting guides that recommend good species to grow in your area – the *Waitakere Gardening Guide* and the *Native to the West Guide to Restoring the Nature of Waitakere*. Contact us to request copies.
- The Council specifies that ecosourced plants be used as part of resource consent conditions to ensure the character of an area is retained. It also requires contractors to use eco-sourced species for park and esplanade plantings.
