## 6 CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

### RECOMMENDATION

It has been another busy month for the Waitakere Community Board. Thank you all for the work you have done and the meetings you have attended. I want to give particular thanks to Elizabeth Francke for representing us at the Council meetings on Regional Governance and Christine Shepherd for her work with the Community Boards' Association. Preparation of the Board's submission to the Royal Commission on Regional Governance was the key task for our Board this month. Our submission is attached at pages A1 to A5 to this report. I am pleased to note that although the various elected authorities in the region came up with widely differing proposals for the future of Auckland, they nearly all included some form of Community Board or Council to ensure grassroots democracy. Most signalled a wish to strengthen this level of local government with increased responsibilities and financial autonomy.

This sentiment was also expressed at the meeting we held at Waiatarua. It was heartening to also hear that the key values of the Eco City should not be lost in any reorganisation. There was a small turnout at the meeting but all areas of the Waitakere Ward and most of our Resident and Ratepayers Associations were represented.

Following on from the presentation we had at our last board meeting I put together a submission on parking - thank you Christine for your input and help with drafting it. This submission is attached at pages A6 to A7 to this report.

I have continued to attend meetings with Mark Tollemache and Fenella Thomas to discuss the issue of where to begin the Local Area Plan (LAP) process now that the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Act is in place. It is fair to say that a common theme of these meetings has been that everyone wants a LAP but no one wants to be first. I think that we must ensure that going first is a more attractive proposition.

Our next major task is to prepare our submission to the draft Annual Plan. It is important that the small projects vital to our area are not lost in the drive to complete the major developments Council has planned in the other Wards. Here is an extract from a letter from a resident of our Ward that I believe needs little further comment: "I have had a property for approx 38 years on Te Ahuahu Road. I hoped that by the time we built and intended to live out at the coast we would have seen this road tarsealed."

I urge our Resident and Ratepayers Associations and other local groups to get their submissions together and to let us know of any items for which they would like the support of their Community Board.

There have been several important community meetings that we have attended. Christine chaired a very efficient meeting at Woodlands Park Primary School where Council officers well thought out plan for improved traffic safety at the Huia Road intersection was introduced to the community. The plans were well received by the local community and their constructive suggestions for improvements were well received by the officers. It was all over in an hour or so and I did not have to be late for my next meeting! The Swanson Residents and Ratepayers' Association has had its Annual General Meeting. The association is in a rebuilding phase seeking to find ways to bring the many active groups working for their community together.

Along with other Board Members I attended a meeting with representatives from the Piha community and staff responsible for event management. It gave us the opportunity to raise questions of just what consequences there should be for non-compliance with consent conditions; what type of events are suitable for a place like Piha; the need for cooperation with the Auckland Regional Council (ARC) where events involve both the ARC and Waitakere City Council; and the need for staff granting and monitoring consents to be fully aware of plans and rules operating in the affected areas. These issues have relevance well beyond Piha and I think as we discuss them further wider consultation will be needed.

Also at Piha the dredging of Claude Abel Pond is underway and the new speed humps have been installed. A meeting there has made good progress towards resolving the issue of stream pollution by the major clubs. Other projects in our Ward, including those at Huia and Karekare, are under way or about to commence so I hope that the weather holds out for their completion.

There have also been very special occasions to celebrate. The Arts Laureate awards were announced on Friday, 18 April at what was a really enjoyable function. In being chosen as laureates, the artists must be recognised leaders in their field and be willing to make a contribution to the future development of the arts in our city. The highlights from the events was the beautiful aria from new laureate, Patricia Wright with the support of Samoan laureates, Fatu Feu'u and Lemi Ponifasio. Fatu is generally acknowledged as our foremost Samoan artist and the novelist Albert Wendt describes Lemi Ponifasio as "a modern taulaitu who fishes out of the depth of our collective being a haunting primeval imagery." The fourth new laureate was artist Peter Siddell. Like the other laureates, Peter has strong links to the Waitakere Ward. Peter and his wife Sylvia have had a second home at Karekare for more than 30 years and the West Coast has inspired some of his finest work. Fatu works out of a studio in Oratia and Patricia Wright is resident in Titirangi. The event was an incredible opportunity to chat with other legends of the arts such as Geoff Moon and Don Binney. My congratulations to Naomi Cleary and the team who put the event together.

There was also a sad note to the occasion in that it was an opportunity for the Arts community of Waitakere to remember the huge contribution made by Mahinarangi Tocker who died so tragically young.

I also had the opportunity to conduct my first Waitakere City citizenship ceremony. I was a bit nervous but did not need to be as the Corporate Administration and Civic Functions officer has events like these running like clockwork. My thanks also to our kaumatua, Papa Fred Holloway, who, supported by his wife Marlene brings both dignity and warmth to the occasion; and to fellow board member Linda Davies who supported me at the event.

Anzac Day was also wonderful day. The dawn service at Waikumete just gets better and bigger every year. The event is given even greater significance by being held in New Zealand's largest war cemetery. It was great to see that many Waitakere Community Board members were present. Later in the day, together with His Worship the Mayor and Board Members Linda Davies and Christine Shepherd, I attended the service at Piha which was also very special and attracted a huge crowd.

A8 Finally I would like to refer to a tragedy from outside our city. The terrible fire in the cool store at Hamilton that took the life of a very experienced fire-fighter and caused terrible injuries to others is a reminder of just what risks our fire-fighters face. The Waitakere Ward relies on many volunteers for a wide range of activities. Some of these involve considerable personal risks such as surf lifesaving and fire fighting. Throughout our ward fire fighting is largely the responsibility of volunteers both Fire Service and Rural Fire. Our rural fire services are well supported by Council and well led by experienced fire-fighter, Peter Barber. Following the tragic fire in Hamilton, Peter has written to all the rural fire-fighters in the city. It is a timely reminder of the dangers these men and women face. Peter's letter is attached at page A8 to this report.

## 9 HUIA ROAD BEND TREATMENT

### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to advise the Waitakere Community Board of the bend treatment works to be carried out on Huia Road in order to address the high proportion of loss of control accidents.

### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Waitakere Community Board resolve to:

**Receive** the Huia Road Bend Treatment report.

### BACKGROUND

1. Following traffic safety concerns raised by residents and the press about the frequent loss of control accidents occurring on Huia Road (between Titirangi Road roundabout and Woodlands Park Road), the Council carried out a study to investigate the problems and to propose solutions.

2. The study was completed in February 2008 and analysed the history of accidents on Huia Road and provided recommended treatments at locations prone to higher accident occurrences.

## DECISION MAKING

### Issues

3. Huia Road is a district arterial road and carries traffic volumes of approximately 4,900 vehicles per day and 450 vehicles per hour during commuter peak hours. The section of Huia Road studied was approximately two kilometres and has a posted speed limit of between 50 kph and 70 kph. Along most of its length the road is about eight metres wide and has many horizontal and vertical crests and some relatively steep gradients with dense vegetation on both sides. The surrounding land use is mainly rural with areas of residential and lifestyle blocks. During summer months, the area has many recreational users due to various popular fishing spots and beaches nearby.
4. A search of the Land Transport New Zealand database shows that there are a high proportion of accidents involving wet weather and loss of control. Most of the loss of control accidents (54% of all accidents) occurred at seven critical bends along the study route.
5. The intersection of Woodlands Park Road, Huia Road and Minnehaha Avenue was also investigated due to its proximity to a primary school and high pedestrian numbers generated due to the nearby retail amenities.

### Options Identified

6. Options were investigated and the following table summarises the preferred treatment at each of the high accident locations on Huia Road.

#### Consideration of Community Views

- The proposed works have been communicated with residents, school representatives and members of the Waitakere Community Board on 18 March 2008 and 8 April 2008. Responses to the works were favourable.

#### STRATEGIC CONTEXT

- Council's Integrated Transport and Communication platform provides the strategic context for this report. The vision is for public transport and communications systems that provide fast, effective services and for safe City travel facilitated by integrated, environmentally-responsible and innovative design, with a focus on meeting the essential needs of all, for access, communication, and safety.
- The proposed treatment can reduce loss of control accidents and help to reduce speeds on Huia Road.

#### CONSULTATION

- Consultation with residents directly affected by the works has been carried out and no adverse feedback was received.

#### RESOURCES

- The works would cost approximately \$372,000 and would be funded from the 2008/2009 proposed Bend Treatment and Minor Safety Budget.

#### IMPLEMENTATION ISSUES

- There are no implementation issues identified at this stage. Upon the completion of detailed design, any resolution reports required would be presented to the Waitakere Community Board for approval.
