2 CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES

- (ii) the Chairperson shall determine the order of speakers, and allow five minutes for speaking time.
- (iii) Questions by members are to be confined to obtaining information or clarification on matters raised by the speaker.

Section 46(7) and (7A) of the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987 provides that no resolution, decision, or recommendation may be made in respect of any specific item of business not on the agenda except to refer the items to a subsequent meeting for further discussion. Therefore, no decision may be made on matters raised in Public Forum. However, written reports on matters raised may be requested from the Chief Executive.



4 **COMMITTEE MEMBERS' REPORTS**

Provision has been made on this agenda for Committee Members should they so wish to submit a report on their activities during the month in regard to matters within the scope and delegations of the Committee. However, to comply with the provisions of the Local Government Official Information and Meetings Act 1987, no decision may be made on matters raised in Committee Members' reports.



5 **CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT**

Provision has been made for the Chief Executive, or his nominated representative, to report on the progress of other matters considered to be of significance to Te Taumata Runanga, including organisation and representation issues.



6 **PROJECT TWIN STREAMS - IWI PARTICIPATION**

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is to advise Te Taumata Runanga of the scope of Project Twin Streams and to establish if Te Taumata Runanga wishes to be represented in the Project Twin Streams Steering Group.

BACKGROUND

The Oratia and Opanuku Stream Catchments have a history of flooding and Council has developed a work programme to address this issue, including the following:

- An ongoing stream clearing and re-planting programme;
- Setting controls on development;
- Implementation of flow monitoring and predictive modelling; and
- Developing a long term comprehensive catchment management plan.

A plan showing the location of the Twin Streams Catchment is attached at page A1.

A report was presented to the Environmental Management Committee on 12 March 2002, which resolved:

- “1. That the resolutions set out hereunder pertaining to Project Twin Streams passed at the Works and Services Committee meeting of 10 September 2001 be confirmed.
 1. That the information be received.
 2. That the Twin Streams project be approved subject to the consideration of funding requirements through the 2002/2003 Annual Budget process.
 3. That all new development in the Oratia and Opanuku Stream catchments be required to mitigate the adverse effects of stormwater, provided that where the adverse effects cannot be fully mitigated developers be given the option of providing partial mitigation and paying in part or in full for stormwater mitigation works to be carried out by the Council in the catchment.
 4. That stormwater mitigation charges be applied to industrial and commercial development in the Oratia and Opanuku Stream catchment calculated on the percentage of impervious area created by the development compared to the total catchment area.”

“That Councillor Stone be the spokesperson for the launch process.”; and

- “1. That the ten year financial commitment required for the implementation of Project Twin Streams be considered through the draft 2002/2003 Annual Plan process.
2. That the Auckland Regional Council be advised of Council’s commitment to Project Twin Streams.
3. That the Chairperson of this Committee be the spokesperson for the consultation programme.”

“That the restoration and enhancement of the Oratia stream be treated as a priority and commenced immediately with appropriate plantings of suitable natives such as Kowhai and Flax and other plants that historically grow in the area with emphasis on the banks between Henderson and Waitakere Stadium.”

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

Project Twin Streams will contribute to the following strategic objectives:

- Implementation of Council’s Long Term Financial Strategy;
- Compliance with the Resource Management Act; and
- Enabling sustainable development in the catchment.

Project Twin Streams promotes integrated management in line with the Resource Management Act, particularly in terms of economic, social and environmental concerns, cross-Council integration, for example with roads, locality planning, parks, urban villages work and integration of stormwater management with protection and enhancement of the natural environment.

WORK PROGRAMME

The work programme for Twin Streams includes the following:

- As a result of discussions with the Auckland Regional Council on Oratia Structure Plan issues, requirements for stormwater management have changed to provide greater flexibility for developers.
- Consultation with iwi and the community as part of the resource consent and implementation programme.
- Flooding risks will continue to be mitigated through the stream clearing and willow removal programme. It is essential that this programme is continued to ensure that the effectiveness of clearing programmes completed for the last six years is sustained.
- The Register of Hazards and Special Feature will be updated with appropriate notations recorded against properties to advise of flooding risks identified in the Comprehensive Catchment Management Plans.
- The effects of increased stormwater runoff and pollution from new development will be mitigated in accordance with the policy adopted by Council of Low Impact Development.
- Detailed site specific planning of the riparian restoration programme will be carried out over the next twelve months in order to optimise solutions. As previously reported, a number of properties will need to be purchased for the implementation programme. It should be noted that riparian restoration programmes are likely to qualify for Infrastructure Auckland funding and an Expression of Interest was submitted in November 2001 and a full application is to be lodged by November 2002.
- The riparian restoration programme will also be developed and implemented in partnership with property owners. This may require an encumbrance on property titles to protect the riparian restoration programme.

The next stage of implementation for Project Twin Streams includes:

- Implementation of the iwi and community participation programme;
- Integration of the research work programme currently being undertaken by Landcare Research; and
- Implementation of the first stage of the project as provided for in the Draft 2002/03 Annual Plan.

FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

It is proposed that the implementation programme will be achieved at minimum cost to Council by developing partnerships and seeking funding from the following sources:

- Stormwater mitigation from development;
- Infrastructure Auckland; and
- Transfund to mitigate the adverse effects of roading stormwater.

PROJECT MILESTONES

It is proposed to establish a Steering Group that will meet every three months to provide advice on the following matters:

- Establishing iwi and community priorities;
- Community participation;
- Implementation overview of the 2002/2003 work programme;
- Developing work programme proposals for consideration by Council through the 2003/2004 Annual Plan and Long Term Council Community Plan.

Subsequently, a further report was submitted to the Environment Management Committee on 9 July 2002, which resolved:

“That a copy of the Project Twin Streams – Community Participation report be forwarded to the Henderson, Massey, New Lynn and Waitakere Community Boards, Te Taumata Runanga, the Eco Matters Environment Trust, all iwi groups and the wider outer community to seek appointment of a voluntary representative to the Project Twin Streams Steering Group.”

CONCLUSION

Project Twin Streams provides a framework to address long-standing issues in the Oratia and Opanuku Stream Catchments.

The next steps in the work programme are as follows:

- Iwi consultation and participation;
- Community participation;
- Confirming the stormwater mitigation Financial Contributions;
- Application for external funding; and
- Implementation of the works programme in the 2002/03 Annual Budget.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That Te Taumata Runanga consider the nomination of a voluntary representative to the Project Twin Streams Steering Group.

- The hui is to be held at the Council Chambers on Saturday 7 September 2002, lead by Te Taumata Runanga representatives with support from Council Officers.
- It will provide Te Taumata Runanga representatives the opportunity to profile and promote their organisations and activities
- Te Taumata Runanga representatives, with Council Officer support, will facilitate the workshops.
- It will be a celebration of what has been achieved by the Maori community and Council as a means of looking forward to what is needed next.
- Artwork and entertainment will bring a sense of celebration and fun to the day.
- Display boards and the State of the City video will provide background information about what has been undertaken and achieved to date.
- Proposed Programme 12.00 noon to 3.00 pm -
 - Karakia
 - Rundown of day (MC)
 - Lunch - entertainment
 - Workshops ongoing (MC to mingle through crowd - draw people into workshops)
 - Karakia/wrap up and thanks.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

The Council is currently reviewing its Strategic Plan. It is committed to gaining a representative view from iwi and the community and therefore it is important that Te Taumata Runanga is involved in the consultation process to encourage full participation.

ISSUES

The key part of the hui organisation is the communications to ensure a good turn out to gain a representative view. Te Taumata Runanga is invited to distribute flyers through their networks and organisations. Council will support this with mail outs to its distribution lists. It is also requested that Te Taumata Runanga representatives play a lead role in workshops to encourage high levels of participation. Consideration is sought for participation at a training session before the hui.

RESOURCES

This project is resourced in the 2002/2003 budget.

CONCLUSION

The assistance of Te Taumata Runanga is sought in encouraging Maori individuals, groups and organisations to have their say on the Strategic Plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That Te Taumata Runanga distribute flyers for the Strategic Review hui through their networks and organisations.

8 TE TAUMATA RUNANGA REPRESENTATION ON OTHER COMMITTEES AND PROJECTS

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this report is to propose a process on protocols for appointing representatives from within the Committees membership or on behalf of Te Taumata Runanga on to other Committees and projects. The report also seeks advice and guidance from the Committee on these protocols for approval.

BACKGROUND

At the Committee's February and March 2002 meetings, the Committee appointed representatives to Committee's, including other partnership arrangements between Council and community groups:

Te Taumata Runanga has already ratified these appointments.

STRATEGIC CONTEXT

Te Taumata Runanga has created a number of opportunities for the Maori Community of the City to be involved in local government decision-making processes, including partnership arrangements between Council and other community groups. The experiences have enabled Te Taumata Runanga to foster a better understanding with the wider community on issues important to the Maori community.

ISSUES

There has been concerns expressed by members of Te Taumata Runanga on how the Committee appoints representatives, and the need to develop a process to ensure the

appropriate skills, expertise and experiences are taken into account before a final decision is made.

The following process and protocols are proposed for the Committee's consideration:

- Council staff or the Project Leader responsible for the project is to provide a report to the Committee on what the project is about, how this is aligned to the Committee's work programme or how this project may impact on the Maori community, what the expectations and the scope of the involvement is for the appointed representative and ensuring the relevant and appropriate skills, expertise, and experience are to be considered when appointments are being considered. There will be occasions when this level of information will not be known because this will be part of the decision making process.

The intent of the report would be to provide an opportunity for the Committee to gain an appreciation of what the project is about and the level of commitment involved.

- Following this report the Committee would meet to discuss and ascertain from within its Committee membership availability or consider the merits of co-opting members of the community to represent Te Taumata Runanga. It is appropriate, in making the appointment of people to represent Te Taumata Runanga when personal details may be discussed (including judgements about personal attributes that individuals may bring to such as an appointment), to exclude the public.

Council's Standing Orders provides that Te Taumata Runanga may exclude the public pursuant to Section 48 of LGOIMA 1987. A resolution to exclude the public must be in the form set out in that Act, include the grounds on which the decision is based and be passed at a time when the meeting is open to the public. The Committee may provide for the release to the public of the matter considered while the public were excluded. The protection of a persons privacy is covered in section 8(1) of the Act and in particular relies on the provision of section 7 (2) (a) as follows:

7. Other reasons for withholding official information.

(2) Subject to sections 6,8, and 17 of this Act, this section applies if, and only if, the withholding of the information is necessary to...

(a) Protect the privacy of the natural persons, including that of deceased natural persons; or...

- Subsequent to the Committee's discussions, the Committee would then makes its formal decision on the appointments of Te Taumata Runanga representatives on other Committee's, or groups.

RESOURCES

There are no additional resources required to implement the process outlined in the report.

CONCLUSION

Te Taumata Runanga 's involvement in a range of local government decision-making processes on to other Committee's, including partnership arrangements between Council and other groups has provided opportunities for issues particular to the Maori Community to be considered alongside the wider city interests. A further consequence of the Committee's involvement, has been a greater understanding by the wider community of Maori values and interests, a bridging of community relationships and a great deal of good will between Council, Te Taumata Runanga and the wider community.

Te Taumata Runanga is keen to ensure the Committees appointments onto Committees and other partnership arrangements between Council and the wider community have the appropriate skills, expertise and experience. The report outlines a process on steps to be undertaken to achieve this.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That the information be received.
2. That Te Taumata Runanga approves the process on appointments of Te Taumata Runanga representatives as outlined in the report, with any amendments.

No resolution, decision, or recommendation may be made in respect of the item except to refer the item to a subsequent meeting for further discussion.

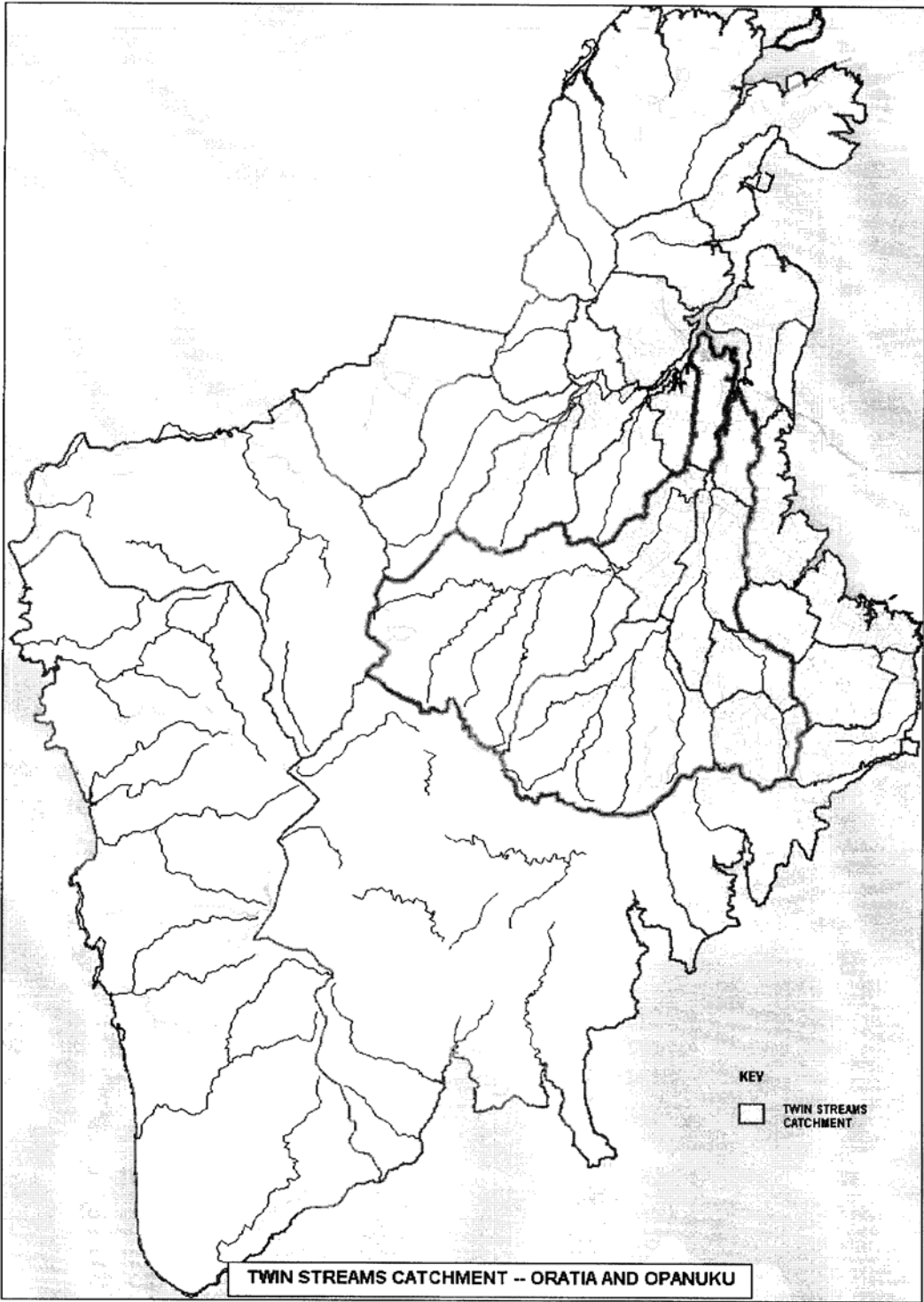


11 NEXT MEETING
